

PROPER CITATION OF MATERIALS PUBLISHED BY THE VERMONT JOURNAL OF ENVIRONMENTAL LAW

1. **GENERALLY**

VJEL is an environmentally-minded journal with a focus of publishing online to reduce the consumption of paper products and fossil fuels to create those products. Although VJEL does publish some material in print, we request you always provide the website address in order to lessen the demand for print publications. If you are citing a VJEL manuscript from another webpage, please hyperlink the citation.

Vermont Journal of Environmental Law should be abbreviated to "VT. J. ENVTL. L."

2. JOURNAL ARTICLES

2.1. Articles Generally

Use the common *Bluebook* rules for citing to articles. Because VJEL only publishes in print to satisfy law library's needs, we request you always provide the website address of the article's PDF. Do not include "*available at*" as this suggests that the online version is secondary to the print version, violating our mission to be an online journal that minimally impacts the environment.

2.2. Supplemented Articles

VJEL publishes web-only articles as supplements to the printed articles. These articles are not paginated until the final issue of an academic year has been published. If publishing before the supplementary article is paginated, please use the following format.

2.3. Translated Laws

In Volume 8, Issue Number 2, VJEL published the translations of two Chinese environmental statutes as an appendix to Moorman & Ge article. Citation to these translated statutes should follow the following format. See *Bluebook* Rule 20.2.5.

2.4. Transcripts

In Volume 8, Issue Number 2, VJEL published the transcripts of the spring symposium. Cite using *Bluebook* Rule 16.6.3.

3. Books & Reports

Cite to books and reports using *Bluebook* Rule 15.

4. Editorials

Cite editorials as if in an online newspaper. Omit "*available*." See *Bluebook* Rules 16.5 and 18.2.3.

5. News

Cite news articles as if in an online newspaper. Omit "*available*." See *Bluebook* Rules 16.5 and 18.2.3.

6. Roscoe Hogan Environmental Law Essay Contest

The *Bluebook* provides no good guidance for these manuscripts. Use the following example.

7. Events

7.1. Citing to an Entire Event

Cite to an entire event using the following example below. This is a modification of *Bluebook* Rules 16.6.3 and 18. Include the date range of the event.

Symposium: "China in Transition: Environmental Challenges in the Far East", Vt. J. Envtl. L. (Mar. 1–2, 2007), http://www.vjel.org/events/EVT10012.html.

7.2. Citing a Posted Audio Recording or PowerPoint Presentation

Cite posted audio recordings and PowerPoint presentations using the following example. The audio recording citation is a modification of *Bluebook* Rules 16.6.3, 17.1.5, and 18.6. The PowerPoint citation is a modification of *Bluebook* Rules 16.6.3, 17.1.5, and 18.5. Do not cite directly to the audio or PowerPoint website file, but rather the webpage the files are linked from. For this reason, include "*available at*" to introduce the website address. Provide what digital format an audio recording is in so that the reader may know whether s/he has the appropriate software.

7.3. Citing to a Transcript

All posted transcripts thus far are printed in the *Journal*. As such, use *Bluebook* Rule 16.6.3.
